October 14: Copy & Paste: Transferring Arboretum Style to Your Landscape

During the 75th anniversary, we continue to feature the Arboretum All-Stars, our top recommended plants for California gardens, to help you create sustainable landscapes at home. Our planting plans and demonstration gardens can make creating your own All-Star gardens even easier.


In 2009, the Arboretum was fortunate to receive a grant from the Elevenia J. Slosson Foundation to create a UC Davis Arboretum All-Star Exhibit, a planting to display our special plant selections. The location for the planting was tricky, a 300-foot-long area on the west side of the Teaching Nursery that is only 20 feet wide. Repeatedly I walked along this area pondering how to create a cohesive garden look on such a long site. I had a great selection of plants to choose from, but how to best arrange them was key to the success of the design.

The Arboretum All-Star planting demonstration bed design comes to you courtesy of the floor design at the Sacramento International Airport (Terminal A)! The carpet and tile flooring features the Sacramento River running though the Central Valley. One day I found myself following the airport's "river" when landscape design lightning struck. The Sacramento River that defines and enhances our region crosses many miles of the Central Valley on its journey to the Pacific Ocean. Rivers "flow" and are natural yet unifying; they lead your eye down a visual pathway that enables you to move along the landscape, yet provide continuity in color and form. Our All-Star landscape needed a river of lavender!

This issue of the Arboretum Review features a planting plan modeled on the north end of this All-Star landscape. Our hope is you'll be able to use it for inspiration as you plan to replace your water-thirsty lawn or revitalize a dreary corner of the garden. We invite you to use this design, or the others found on our website (arboretum.ucdavis. edu) as a starting point. We'll also have plans available to you at our second fall sale on Sunday, October 14 from 9 am – 1 pm when we will highlight this idea of "Copy & Paste: Transferring Arboretum Style

ALL-STAR PLANTING PLAN (not to scale)



Inspired by another area of our landscape? When you visit the Arboretum, take notes and a camera (or smart phone) to document the plants and landscape designs that you like. Note the size, form, and appearance of mature plantings in the Arboretum collections so you know what to expect in your yard. Notice combinations of colors, shapes, and blooming times that can provide year-around interest. Next, think about your available planting areas. Determine the amount of sun and shade these areas receive over the course of the year and select plants adapted to your sun exposure. Consider plant combinations you like from Arboretum gardens and use them as a starting point to make your own design statement.

Please bring your ideas and questions to the upcoming the Friends of UC Davis Arboretum plant sales at the Arboretum Teaching Nursery. At the sales, staff, volunteer gardeners and local nursery professionals will help you find the plants you want and advise you on plant combinations. Our dedicated sales staff will help you choose the best plants to create your own sustainable slice of heaven, to establish inviting habitats for hummingbirds and other pollinators, and to reduce your water and chemical needs in the process. Arboretum All-Star care tips for fall

Not only is fall a good time to plant, it is a great time to expand your garden by dividing your plants.



CANYON SNOW PACIFIC IRIS

Iris 'Canyon Snow'

In the fall, this spring bloomer begins moving out of its summer slow-growth period. In late September/October you'll see this iris begin growing actively again, which is a good time to think about

dividing. Look for baby leaves around the base of the plant. This tells you that the plant has a better chance of re-growing when transplanted. Take a trowel and gently divide those first flushes of growth from the mature base, being sure to dig up as many of the baby leaves' roots as possible. Once you have a clump of baby leaves separated, replant it in a partly shady area and water it just as you would any new planting. Once it is established, its water needs are low, but its beauty and impact in your garden remain high. Don't hesitate share the wealth with friends!



HEN AND CHICKS

Echeveria 'Imbricata'
Early fall is also a great time to divide
your Echeveria 'Imbricata.' This plant can
be divided in spring, but we are lucky
in this region to also have time in late
September/early October to establish

plants before the winter months. Look under the skirt of the "hen" or the larger plant in the center for the "chicks." Wait until they are large enough to see, or about 1/3 the size of the hen to divide. Other visual cues that may indicate the timing is right to divide is when you begin to see small, white roots developing under the chicks. The white roots tell you that the chicks have established their own roots and are ready to grow on their own. Gently pinch the stem of the chick off the main hen; hopefully you'll have an inch or two of stem to work with. Place it in the soil of its new home, which may be in your garden or a pot in a sunny spot of your window sill. Water a couple times a week; once established, you only need to water it every couple of weeks.

Fall is also a good time to tidy up plants like fescue that experience a slow-growth period over the summer.



CALIFORNIA FESCUE

Festuca californica

This plant, like many California natives, blooms in the spring then goes through a slow-growth period over the summer. After a couple seasons of enjoying its airy, golden

flowers, fall is the time to remove the old stalks for a tidier appearance. Personally, I don't remove the spent stalks until they are bent over, then I pinch them off as far down to the base of the plant as I can manage. This may seem tedious, but it is amazing how many stalks you can pull out in less than 30 seconds—not a bad maintenance plan for a plant that requires little to no attention the rest of the year!

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UNDER CONSTRUCTION: ANIMAL SCIENCE GATEWAYS GARDEN

You may have noticed the new path and stone retaining walls in the Southwest USA and Mexican Collection. The path is designed to connect Arboretum visitors with a new Animal Science GATEway Garden at the neighboring Cole Facility. With funding from the College of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, the Arboretum has been partnering with the Animal Science Department to build this new garden, which will feature a horse-viewing area, forage crops, information about the department, and a gathering area shaded by a magnificent valley oak tree. Designed by recent UCD alumnus John Gainey, the garden is being built by Arboretum staff, students, volunteers, and the Animal Science Farm Crew.

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
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From the Director
